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## **PRECIS MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF HEVINGHAM PARISH COUNCIL**

**HELD ON 2nd APRIL 2019 AT THE VILLAGE HALL**

**4. MATTERS ARISING** - The Clerk advised: - The farmer concerned has advised they have procured a road sweeper to help keep on top of the mud.

**5. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION** - Cllr M Williamson advised he has received complaints concerning a hedge on The Heath which is obscuring visibility and making the bend dangerous. The Clerk will contact the property owners.

- The Treasurer from the Village Hall Committee reported that the swing frames are rotting and having made various enquiries he has been advised not to repair but replace. Two quotes have been obtained £2110.00 / £2625.00 both + vat but including installation. The new swings would have a metal sleeve around the post to help prolong the lifespan. The Village Hall can put in a maximum of £750.00 and the Youth Group have offered £600.00. Would the Parish Council be prepared to cover the remaining £1182.00? Following discussions, it was agreed the Council would cover the £1182.00.

- It was asked if the date for the Village Hall AGM had been set yet and how many people had indicated their intention to resign. The Treasurer advised the date had not yet been agreed and it is understood the Secretary, Booking Clerk and Chair will be resigning.

- Cllr A Coldham advised Mrs Marr's famous toffee cream tart recipe has been published.

- It was reported that the road sign for Doctors Hill is laying in the hedge. The Clerk will refer to the appropriate authority.

**6b. Finance Accounts for payment** - The following account had already been paid and was approved:

The Clerks standing order will be paid on the 5th April.

The Clerk was passed an invoice for £180.00 for the grass cutting at the Church but this had only been agreed for the 2018/19 season. Following discussions, all agreed as the Parish Council have always paid for the grass cutting at the Church and many have commented on how good it looks, the Council will cover this again for the 2019/20 season.

The following receipt was noted: Bank interest	£8.55
Balance at the bank now stands at	£47,671.06

The Clerk has been contacted by the Primary School asking if they could have an allotment for the Easter - Summer term for a food growing / farm project, ideally free of charge. This was agreed.

**6c. Herbert Philipo Fund** - The Clerk has now heard from the Under 5's and they have said they 'would like to use the money but are cautious not to spend it unnecessarily and save it for much needed repairs and have it by them for emergencies'. Following

discussions, all agreed this is not what the original money was given for and so it should be put back into the 'pot' for use elsewhere. Should the Under 5's need funds in the future, they can come to the Parish Council who will consider and see what they can do at that time.

**7e. Police Report** - The Clerk advised there were 2 crimes recorded in the village during January - violent/sexual offence (on or near The Turn and The Heath. Further information can be accessed via [www.police.uk](http://www.police.uk).

**7f. Reports County Councillor** - The NDR is still the 'bane' of his life. A resident asked why the graffiti on the NDR is being classed as art and if he did something similar on the NCC building would that be acceptable. Cllr D Roper will take that comment back to NCC.

A member of the public thanked all on the Parish Council for their work but especially wanted to thank Cllr A Coldham, not just for her work with the Parish Council but in all she does in the village generally and felt it should be recorded. All agreed and a round of applause followed.

## Pregnant smokers encouraged to quit

Women who smoke during pregnancy are being urged to quit to help reduce the risk of seriously affecting the health of their baby. Norfolk County Council Public Health has produced an animated [video](https://youtu.be/9uAXtGx5pfA) <<https://youtu.be/9uAXtGx5pfA>> to highlight the dangers of smoking during pregnancy and the support available to help smokers quit.

Smoking in pregnancy is harmful for both the mother and the unborn child. Carbon monoxide enters the mother's blood, together with around 4,000 other cigarette chemicals, and limits the oxygen that reaches the baby. It results in an increased risk of the baby being born prematurely, being born too small or even dying before birth.

Having a baby is a great reason to give up smoking. If you're pregnant and struggling to quit smoking, talk to your midwife or contact Smokefree Norfolk, Norfolk's specialist stop-smoking service.

Advisors will work with you to find what works best for you; offering everything from intensive support, group sessions, one-to-one appointments, and drop-in sessions, all delivered in locations around the county.

## E-cigarettes in pregnancy

Are e-cigarettes safe to use?

- E-cigarettes aren't risk free, but they are much less harmful than smoking
- If using an e-cigarette helps you stay smokefree, it is much safer for you and your baby than smoking

Can I still smoke a bit of tobacco?

- NO - Every cigarette harms you and your baby
- The only way to stop this is to stop smoking tobacco completely
- You can use your e-cigarette as often as you need to stay smokefree



Can I use an e-cigarette to help me quit smoking?

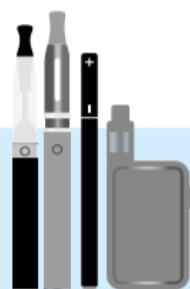
- The safest products to use are nicotine replacements such as patches and gum
- If you find an e-cigarette helpful, it is far safer than continuing to smoke

Is nicotine harmful for my baby?

- Nicotine alone is relatively harmless
- The main harm from smoking comes from the thousands of chemicals in tobacco smoke

Is it OK for others to use e-cigarettes around me?

- It is far safer than allowing smoking
- Secondhand tobacco smoke is very harmful to you and your baby
- There is no evidence of harm to others from e-cigarette vapour



Using an e-cigarette is far safer than smoking

- E-cigarettes allow you to inhale nicotine through a vapour rather than smoke
- E-cigarettes don't burn tobacco, and don't produce tar or carbon monoxide
- Vapour contains much lower levels of harmful chemicals than smoke

# Rector's Ramblings

## Church Roof Service and Celebration

In May we welcomed 50 people to our celebration and giving thanks for the Church Roof being repaired. The Parish Council Chair and Parish Councillors, David Lemon from Spire Property Consultants who looked after the project management, representatives from the Geoffrey Watling Fund who gave a grant and messages from other grant bodies made this a wonderful celebration. I was asked if I could share my talk from this special service, which is as follows. I hope you find it inspiring!

*You do know Hevingham have recently had the lead stolen of their church roof don't you? So said a colleague of mine as I told him I was being interviewed for Rector in July 2016. I was reassured about the work being done at the interview and so no concerns!*

Over the following couple of years I often reread this from the Bible:

“Let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus who is the pioneer and perfecter of our faith” Hebrews 12:1b, 2a

Perseverance, the dictionary tells me, means to “continue in a course of action despite any difficulty or a lack of success”. In my assembly at Hevingham Primary School early in May I told the story of perseverance and the church roof! I asked the children why we should have bothered about getting the roof repaired when we can worship God in any building. I was amazed at their reaction: they looked horrified I would even suggest such a thing! Their reasons:

- It's old, and people will want to visit it
- People have been christened there, and others will want their babies christened
- Where would people get married
- What about the people buried in the churchyard, it's important to visit them
- It's history
- Everyone sees it from the road

So right. Good job we keep going then!

From April 2017 I met with both my Church Wardens at the time and our Fabric Officer. We planned and allocated our roles and so the momentum for the roof repairs really started.

Who will forget the Parish Council meeting when Patsy from the Hevingivers spoke and asked for a grant for “our church”? I sat and listened and was overwhelmed by the amount agreed. Having the first successful grant application confirmed in 2017 from

the Geoffrey Watling Trust was so encouraging as was the wonderful Gift Day held that year.

Last summer it became clearer what the purpose of the church building is. This church is named after St Botolph, a 7<sup>th</sup> Century Abbot. He is the Saint for travellers. With the church building open daily from November 2017 with the wonderful automatic locking/unlocking door device, it has been moving to read the visitors book who come into this amazing place. This building needed to remain open.

The purpose of the church we've rediscovered: whether it is those passing through on their journey, or those coming in for their spiritual and faith journeys, it's a place for those on a journey.

During 2018, the PCC were very conscious of entering a 3<sup>rd</sup> winter last year without a roof and the impact this would have. Crystal, our Treasurer, and I went through the finances and worked out if every penny Hevingham Church had and with the offer of 2 interest free loans, one to cover the VAT of £9,000 (which we'll claim back) and another one for £10,000, the work could start. The PCC meeting, when we agreed to this, was emotional. We knew we were taking a calculated step of faith but we were inspired by Canon Marsham, Rector here in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century, when the nave roof had to be repaired. It was completed but with unexpected extra work they owed around £75! We read about the faith and the community and it was paid. When a PCC has a unity of purpose and heart for God, they truly decide to run the race focusing on Jesus. Inspirational. This was the moment when we recognised God wanted to bless the work and people who use this building. We believed God was saying “go for it!”

The planning began in earnest. God even looked after the bats. They were nowhere to be seen when the Bat Society came along to inspect! The work so efficiently completed at a time of year when the weather can be dreadful; only 1 day was lost because of it. Further grants and donations came in but the loans were still needed.

But we heard in the gospel reading [the day of the celebration service]

*“I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid” (John 14:27)*

If only I had remembered this in January this year. I had sleepless nights. The invoice was due on the 11<sup>th</sup> for the roofing company and the accounts would be emptied, the loans taken on. A phone call from a solicitors on the 5<sup>th</sup> January changed everything, by a legacy of £37,500! The money was in our account



ready for payment day! Coincidence? God's provision because you just can't make that kind of thing happen. No loans, the roof paid for as were all the other invoices. Now we can look to the future for God has plans for this place.

But today we can truly give thanks to God, our extraordinary provider.

### **The Future**

The PCC have since met and have agreed the priorities. The accessible entrance will make a huge difference and so we've contacted Spire again to give us plans and guidance before the fund raising and legal aspects commence. Secondly plans for a toilet, and potential kitchenette to be drawn up and costed. Again there is much legal work and more grants will need to be applied for. With around £20,000 capital, even after the essential maintenance jobs being completed in June, we've some capital to invest in what will be at least three times this amount.

We have welcomed Tracey Matthewson as Secretary to our PCC. She is a wonderful addition to and support to our work at the Church.

### **2. APPOINTMENTS**

a. Cllr M Williamson proposed Cllr P Carrick for Chairman which was seconded by Cllr S Ward and agreed by all. Cllr P Carrick accepted office.

b. The Chairman proposed Cllr S Ward for Vice Chairman which was seconded by Cllr J Norton and agreed by all.

c. Cllr M Williamson confirmed he was happy to continue as Village Hall Representative and this was agreed by all.

d. Cllrs A Bunn and M Williamson confirmed they were happy to continue on the Allotment Committee and Cllrs S Howes, I Nickalls and D Holmes also put themselves forward which was agreed by all.

e. Cllr A Ramsbottom confirmed she was happy to continue as Youth Advocate and this was agreed by all.

### **8. MATTERS TO REPORT**

#### **e. Annual Police Report**

PC P Magee introduced himself to the meeting before giving the annual figures for 1/4/18 – 31/3/19 which cover the Hevingham Ward and so includes Hainford and Stratton Strawless.

During the period a total of 494 calls were received by the Police although only 111 related to Hevingham specifically. Of these 111, only 39 actual crimes were recorded. The main offences were 'assaults' in varying categories.

At present the Police are concerned with gangs (known to be eastern european travellers) who are targeting rural communities and especially farmers so they suggest everyone reviews their security and if you see anything suspicious report it: The non-emergency number is 101 and for emergencies call 999.

### **5. MATTERS ARISING**

The Clerk advised:

The 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed may vary slightly each time as this is based on the first 85 vehicles in 100 and is dependent on the speed that the vehicles are going through the sign. This is better than taking an overall average and it excludes the odd high speeders which would give false figures.*

*Drivers who exceed the 90<sup>th</sup> percentile have a significantly higher risk of crashing.*

*The Police use the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed to set speed limits and check they are appropriate.*

## **PRECIS MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF HEVINGHAM PARISH COUNCIL**

### **3. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING**

Minutes of the meeting held on the 7<sup>th</sup> May 2019 were agreed by all and signed by the Chairman.

### **4. MATTERS ARISING**

- The Chairman advised the event the Hevingivers put on to raise funds for the swing at the Village Hall did not take place however, Cllr S Ward confirmed they would still cover the VAT element as the Laurel Club donated £200.00 and the Hevingivers have funds for the remaining £222.00.

- The issue concerning horses on the footpath has been resolved and whilst the path left across the potato field is not quite in the correct place, it can still be used. A resident commented that the area of path near the bridge is very muddy making it un-useable. The Chairman will look at that.

- Cllr J Norton advised the posts are ready for the Village Green and asked who they needed to go to for installation. The Chairman advised he will collect and install.

- The Clerk has checked the Japanese knotweed and it has now been cut back from the road. It is not an offence to allow this plant to grow on private land, only to let it spread to someone else's property. The plant does not affect drains and Highways will generally only get involved if growth is disrupting paths or road surfaces.

- Members of the allotment committee have looked at possible sites for the second water tap and feel it would be better to ask the tenants where they would prefer to have it. It could either be sited 'back to back' with the existing tap or further down towards Westgate. The Clerk will contact the tenants.

- Cllr D Holmes advised whilst carrying out his inspection tenants raised the issue of weeds, manure and the roped area with him. Following discussions, it was agreed Cllr D Holmes will investigate the cost of someone rotovating and strimming the empty plots as tenants are not keen on weed killer being used and also strimming the field edge and orchard. The Clerk will also remind tenants about maintaining their own plots so as not to cause a nuisance to others.

The roped area is no longer needed so can be removed.

- A tenant present wanted to record a note of thanks to the tenant of plots 5 and 18 for the work he does in keeping the central grassed pathway tidy. The Clerk stated Cllr M Williamson had also asked that thanks be minuted to previous Councillors G Crane and S Medler for all the work they put in on the allotments.

- Cllr D Holmes will also re-do the plot numbers so they are clearer.

### **5. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION**

i) Complaints were made regarding the new signs on the A140 Cromer Road however these were determined and installed by Highways, following the village petition, in line with their regulations and the Parish Council had no input into what has been completed. A member of the public believed County Cllr D Roper was looking into and so it will be left for him to respond.

ii) A resident asked about the bus stop on the A140 Cromer Road and the Clerk advised she has yet to receive a reply, despite chasing on numerous occasions.

iii) Complaints were received regarding inconsiderate parking along The Street and Town Corner. The Chairman commented that in the absence of double yellow lines it is difficult to prevent parking, although there are rules concerning parking near junctions which should be adhered to. It was agreed the Clerk should ask the Police if they can put some cones in to stop parking.

iv) Residents stated the bus stop is in a terrible state with litter being left inside. The stop is cleaned once a month however it is really down to users to put their rubbish in the bin.

v) A resident commented that the drain in the layby on the A140 Cromer Road and 2 others on Low Lane are blocked, causing water to flood down into Low Lane near his property. The Clerk will report to highways.

Comments were made that horses are using the path and the riders are not clearing up after them.

ii) All projects are now complete leaving a fund of £20,381.48 which Councillors will need to consider how best to use.

The Chairman suggested some funds could be used to help the Under 5's get back up and running which was generally thought a good idea, however the Clerk will have to investigate if this is permitted.

## 7. MATTERS TO REPORT

### b. Clerks Report

The Clerk has reported flooding on Westgate Green as this was highlighted with her last week by a resident, however Highways so far have said they cannot find the problem. The Clerk will continue to press for action on this.

### e. Police Report

The Clerk advised there were 3 crimes recorded in the village during March:

1 x violent/sexual offence (on or near Pound Close), 1 x criminal damage and arson (on or near Pound Close) and 1 x vehicle crime (on or near Park/Open Space).

Since then Django has entered several chess events and is doing well.



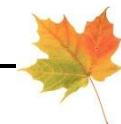
In April there were 7 crimes recorded:

## Helping Hedgehogs in the Garden



Hedgehogs born late in the season sometimes do not have enough fat storage to survive hibernation, so here are a few things we can do to help them.

Hedgehogs usually hibernate between October/November through to mid-March/April, but they are sometimes seen in winter.

Hedgehogs are useful garden visitors as they eat slug's beetles and a variety of other insects.

If possible attract them to your garden by making a natural shelter (log), bramble and leaves. Leave out a shallow bowl of water and food if needed but by creating the right environment this should attract the insects. If you have an enclosed garden you can always cut a small hole to allow the hedgehog's access or dig a small tunnel.

If you have a garden pond please make sure you create a way of climbing out should a hedgehog or other small animal fall in.

Strimmer's and lawn mowers should be used with care. Always check the area before cutting as a hedgehog may be resting in the shade. Always check bonfires before lighting them.

Hedgehogs are wild animals and being handled can be stressful for them but if you do find an injured, orphaned or sick hedgehog you can prepare a cardboard box, with a towel or newspaper and scoop them up gently with garden gloves or a towel. Keep the box in a warm dark place and call the RSPCA or your local animal or wildlife rescue who can advise you on what to do next.

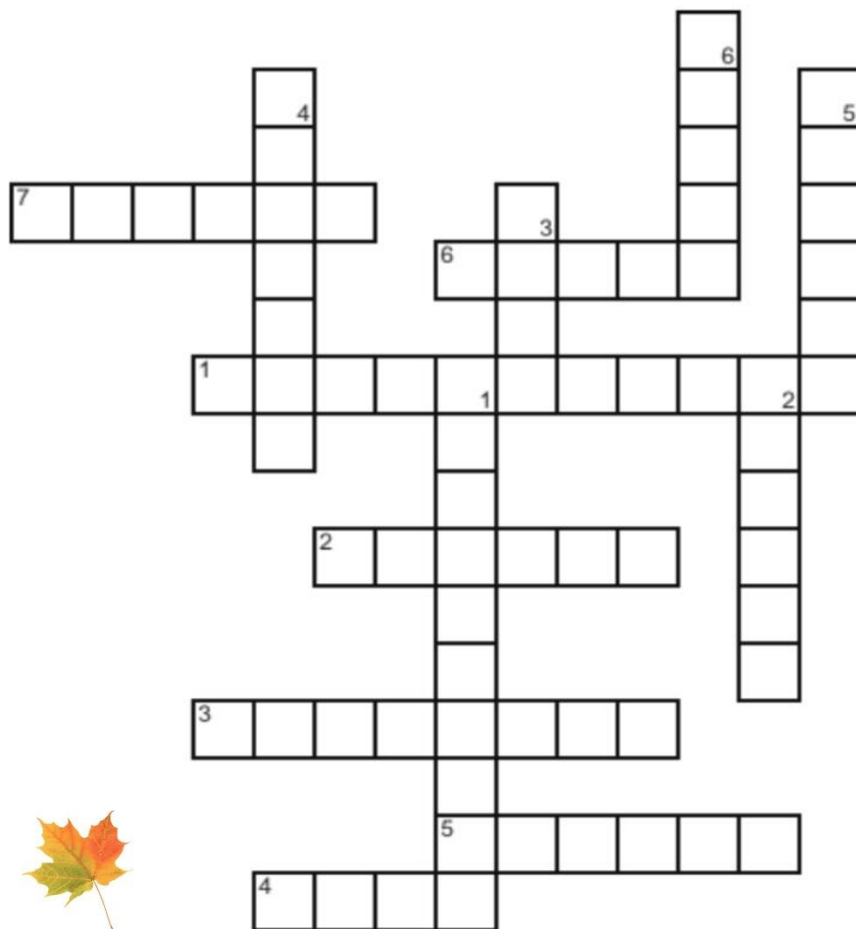

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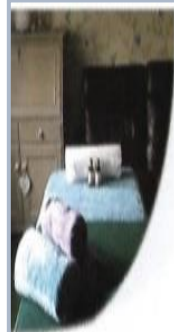
