**PRECIS MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF HEVINGHAM
PARISH COUNCIL**

HELD ON 2nd JULY 2019 AT THE VILLAGE HALL

1. APOLOGIES

Apologies were received from Councillors S Howes,
S Benton and County Cllr D Roper.

**2. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST AND DISPENSATION
REQUESTS**

There were no declarations of interest or dispensation
requests.

3. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

Minutes of the meeting held on the 4th June 2019 were
agreed by all and signed by the Chairman.

4. MATTERS ARISING

- The Clerk advised Cty Cllr D Roper has spoken to Highways
concerning the signs on the A140 Cromer Road and having
checked, they have confirmed that the correct marker signs
are in place, at the right distances, as per the original plan,
to Highways standards and regulations.
Highways went over and above with the 'THINK' signs etc
so no further action will be taken. .

- The Clerk advised she has now heard back regarding a
new bus stop on the A140 Cromer Road as follows:
In principle I would endorse a pair of bus stops on the
straight section heading into the village after the bend and
layby.
However, the budget allocated to new bus stops is minimal
and has already been exhausted for this financial year,
therefore, any proposed stops would have to be funded
through the Parish Partnership Scheme or another external
source.

Because of the 40mph speed limit it would be advisable to
have a central reservation for crossing and the northbound
side would need extensive build to accommodate the
grassy verge.

Both factors would vastly increase the cost.
An identical situation recently cost in excess of
£100,000.00.

All agreed the Parish Council do not have the funds to
pursue this, even via the Parish Partnership Scheme.

- The Chairman has checked the area of path near the
bridge but found no sign of mud. Bearing in mind this path
is in a rural location, some mud should be expected at
times, particularly after a wet period.

5. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

i) A member of the public advised she is looking to move
into the Village and wonders if there is development
intended anywhere. The Chairman stated two sites were
submitted for development under the GNLP but it is likely

to be September / October 2019 before any further
information is received on these.

ii) A resident commented that the signs on the Village
Green are being ignored by horses. Cllr D Holmes will
install a larger sign on the bin post and a note will be put in
the magazine and on the village Facebook page.

iii) A resident asked if a restriction could be put on HGV's
coming down Church Lane from the A140 Cromer Road as
the road is not suitable, particularly for the vehicles which
go to Wallers Sawmill, and they are trying to turn around in
The Turn, causing issues.

All agreed this is not an option as HGV's visit other
businesses as well as the sawmill and it is better for those
vehicles to enter from the Cromer Road.

The Chairman will speak to Wallers Sawmill and ask them
to remind drivers of the need to come in from the Holt
Road.

iv) A resident reported faded and dirty signs on Church
Lane. The Clerk will report the faded signs and has already
asked the Rangers to clean all the signs in the Village.

v) It was reported that the access gates on The Heath into
Buxton Heath are very stiff. Cllr M Williamson said he had
reported this seven months ago but will mention it again to
the Chair of the Hevingham Relief In Need Charity and ask
that this be raised again with the Norfolk Wildlife Trust.

6. MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION AND DECISION

a. Planning

The following plan was considered:

i) 20190910 – Durose Cottage, 2 The Heath – removal of
hedge to replace with fence - SUPPORT.

The following update was provided:

ii) 20181944 – The Gables, Low Lane – Full approval.

b. Finance

The following accounts were presented for payment and
were approved:

The Clerks standing order will be paid on the 5th July.

The Clerk advised of two requests for donations: Norfolk
Age UK and Scotty's Little Soldiers.

Cllr A Ramsbottom proposed both be given a small
donation which was seconded by Cllr J Norton.

All agreed £20.00 should be given to each.

The following receipt was noted:

Magazine adverts £15.00

Balance at the bank now stands at £48,414.87.

c. Herbert Phillipo Fund

Having reviewed the new SAM information, all agreed to put the purchase of one of these on the 'back burner' for now.

d. Allotments

i) Following discussions, it was agreed the Clerk will contact Anglian Water to see if it would be possible to site a further two taps on the site. The Clerk will also clarify the use of hose pipes.

ii) It was agreed, following deliberations, that:

- those tenants who are not keeping their plots in a suitable condition, should be offered mowing or rotovating at cost or they must clear their plot themselves within two weeks, or risk losing their plot in September.
- The Clerk will ask P H Collins to cut/trim the four vacant plots and orchard, trim between the allotments and footpath and trim the footpath and the central roadway if the tenant currently doing this does not mind.

iii) All agreed plot 14 could continue to be kept free for tenants to use for composting as manure is no longer freely available. The Clerk will investigate possible containers in case a general 'heap' proves too messy.

A tenant commented that someone is allowing their dog is run around on the allotments leaving their mess behind. Cllr D Holmes will source and put up a sign on both gates.

Cllr M Williamson has levelled the roadway into the Farmers allotments as it was very bumpy but it now needs some more rubble in the entrance to stop the soil spreading onto the road, particularly in wet weather. The Chairman will speak to a local contractor to see if he can help with some clean rubble.

e. Bus stop on the A140 Cromer Road / Litter

Cllr S Ward advised he contacted BDC to check the position regarding emptying of the bin and was told it was emptied every Tuesday and the area within a 5 metre radius of the bin cleansed, with a litter pick of the general area, including the bus stop, being done fortnightly.

BDC will be monitoring the situation so we should continue to do so too and report any issues.

The Chairman confirmed he has ordered a set of litter picking equipment from BDC for use within the Village and will confirm when this is received.

f. Hevingham Under 5's

The Chairman advised a survey has now been completed on the mobile and a report given to the School. Things do not appear to be as bad as they look on the face of it. Following discussions all agreed that £5,000.00 be set aside, from monies remaining in the Herbert Phillipo Fund, to be used to get the under 5's up and running again. This sum is only set aside however on the provision that the School guarantees to re-open the Under 5's in September

2019. Any money will be given via the 'Friends of Hevingham School' and only upon receipt of an invoice (paid or due).

7. MATTERS TO REPORT

b. Clerks Report

The Clerk met with the new local Highways man to discuss some ongoing issues within the village and can report:

Hedge on Village Green – the rear section is owned by Highways and they will be cutting it. The section which comes towards Westgate is not owned by Highways. All present believed it would come under Westgate House, so the Clerk will contact the owner to get that section cut.

Drain on Westgate Green – the drain will be cleared again and investigations made into why it keeps overflowing.

New Road – Highways will be carrying out some investigations into the 'flooding' over the Summer holidays to see what can be done to alleviate this.

f. Reports

District Councillor

Cllr J Neesam attended a briefing at BDC last night regarding the GNLP which covers development and growth between 2018 and 2036. The initial plan last year was for housing, with 42,000 homes to be built within the area covered by the GNLP. 35,000 have been identified so far, some of which have already been done with a further 7,000 still to be identified. The biggest swathe of housing will be in the South Norwich / Cambridge area with others in North East Norwich and the ring road near the airport. If any one site has more than 15 homes proposed, there must be affordable houses too.

BDC are changing their affordable criteria, to bring it in line with South Norfolk, to allow anyone outside of the 'local area' to apply for affordable housing in Broadland.

If anyone is needing affordable housing it is recommended that you get your name down as soon as possible as houses will be allocated on a 'first come, first served' basis.

County Councillor

The Chairman read the following note in Cllr D Ropers absence:

The County Council is planning for next year's budget on the basis of a further increase in Council tax of 1.99%. However, this will still require further cuts in services. At present the Council is planning for £40m of reductions next year but in a worst case scenario this could have to go as high as £70m depending on cuts to government grants. There is current work ongoing on the NDR roundabouts but in practice this is mainly routine repair and maintenance. Repairing of the lines is not included in the current work but I have been assured it will be done soon.

The Council is currently launching its six year vision "together for Norfolk". This is online if anyone cares to read it.

The meeting closed at 21:15

**2. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST AND DISPENSATION
REQUESTS**

Cllrs T Palmer and M Williamson declared an interest in item 6dv.

3. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

Minutes of the meeting held on the 2nd July 2019 were agreed by all and signed by the Chairman.

4. MATTERS ARISING

- The Clerk advised the Police do not have any cones that can be placed on The Street or Town Corner as it is now the responsibility of the agency/person requiring them to provide them. The Police will however 'take a look' when passing.
- The Clerk has spoken to the occupier of Westgate House who has agreed to take on responsibility for cutting the hedge by the side of the Village Green.

5. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

- It was asked if the children could be involved in planting the new hedging along the side of the trod path on Brick Kiln Road. Following discussions it was agreed, as long as the Primary School take on the responsibility for the risk assessment and any safety issues, the Council would be happy for them to do this.
- The Chairman asked for clarification as to who owns the path alongside the allotments. The Clerk confirmed it is the Parish Council's responsibility. The Chairman will meet with a local resident to assess the path's condition.
- A complaint was received concerning the hedge on the corner of Brick Kiln Road. The Clerk should write to the owner.
- A resident asked if a dog poo bin installed on The Heath near the gate into Buxton Heath. The Clerk will speak to BDC.

6. MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION AND DECISION

a. Remembrance service and laying of wreath

The Vicar asked if the Parish Council would like to lay a wreath at the remembrance service in Hevingham. Cllr M Williamson offered to do this and all agreed. Cllr S Howes proposed the Council donate £100.00 which was seconded by the Chairman and agreed by all.

b. Hevingham Under 5's

The headteacher gave a brief resume of where they are with the Under 5's and explained that funding is an issue

and will dictate whether or not it can re-open. Following discussions, it was agreed the Parish Council will stand by the offer of £5000.00 as it is keen to see the Under 5's open again.

ii) The Council were presented with 3 quotes for printing of the magazine and agreed to remain with the current supplier.

iii) The Clerk presented 3 quotes for the street lighting contract and all agreed to change to Westcotec on a 3-year contract.

d. Allotments

i) The Clerk reported that 5 tenants were contacted following the last meeting and 4 of those have taken action with 1 deciding to quit their plots. The Clerk raised concerns about some of the tenants being allowed to continue due to lack of use and it was agreed those should be contacted to ask what their intentions are going forward. Rubble has not been forthcoming in the farmers 'entrance'. It was agreed 15 ton of crushed rubble would be organised.

ii) The Clerk reported that having contacted Anglian Water she has been advised that the Council can either extend the current tap to put another 1 or 2 in elsewhere or apply for a new connection. The Clerk was also advised that use of hoses can be granted. It was felt that a new connection would not be cost effective and installing additional taps would have a negative effect on the pressure so Cllrs S Howes and I Nickalls will look at installing a 'splitter' on the current tap.

iii) The Allotment Health and Risk Assessment had been circulated and was agreed by all with immediate effect.

iv) The Allotment Rules and Regulations had been circulated and was agreed by all to take effect when tenancies are renewed at the end of the month.

v) It was agreed to leave both the farmers and village allotment rents as they are for another year.

e. Picnic benches on the Village Green

The Clerk had circulated photographs of the 2 benches which need replacement. All agreed the Clerk should order 2.

f. Trees on Church Lane

The Clerk had circulated photographs where visibility is greatly reduced by overgrown trees and asked for the Council's permission to obtain quotes to have some trees removed and others trimmed. Cllr M Williamson asked that the farmers allotments 'entrance' also be looked at. All agreed the Clerk should obtain quotes for consideration at the next meeting.

g. Wild flower meadows

The Chairman proposed having an area within the village as a wild flower meadow. Norfolk doesn't have very many and there is a UK wide push to increase these. Two areas were suggested – the Orchard within the allotment site and the old Surveyors allotment on The Heath. The Clerk will contact Dist Cllr J Neesam to see who would now be responsible for the surveyor's allotments at BDC to follow that up and seek comments from the allotment holders on the orchard.

A new committee is in place and running smoothly. There was an incident recently when children in the play area who were attending a party at the hall were 'upset' by children from the village, resulting in the Police attending.

e. Police Report

The Clerk advised there were no crimes in the village during May however there were 3 recorded crimes in June: 1 other (on or near Cromer Road), 1 violent or sexual offence (on or near Cromer Road), 1 antisocial behaviour (on or near Park / Open space) and 3 recorded crimes in July: 1 antisocial behaviour (on or near Morgans Way), 1 violent or sexual offence (on or near Churchill Close), 1 public order offence (on or near Park / Open space). The next GNLP report is due out soon and will be subject to further consultation.

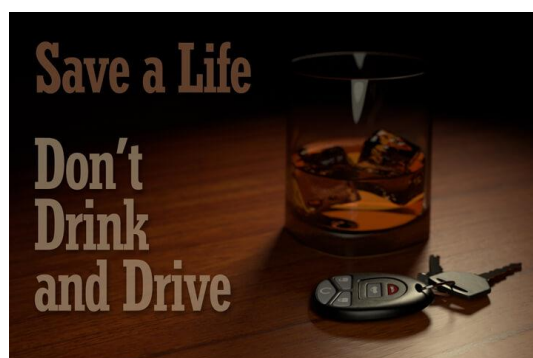
As mentioned previously Broadland now have a funding pot of £500.00 per Councillor which can be used for community projects.

The **85th Percentile Speed** is the speed that 85 percent of vehicles do not exceed. Another way of looking at this is that only 15 percent of vehicles go faster than this speed, and 85 percent go at or below this speed. The 85th percentile speed may vary slightly each time as this is based on the first 85 vehicles in 100 and is dependent on the speed that the vehicles are going through the sign. This is better than taking an overall average and it excludes the odd high speeders which would give false figures. Drivers who exceed the 90th percentile have a significantly higher risk of crashing. The Police use the 85th percentile speed to set speed limits and check they are appropriate

4. MATTERS ARISING

- The Clerk advised she has spoken to the owner of the hedge on Brick Kiln Road and it will now be trimmed.
- The matter of the dog bin has been referred to the owners of the land - Hevingham Relief In Need Charity - who have advised: *With reference to the issues raised concerning the Dog Bin on Buxton Heath. We are sorry this is not part of our charitable remit. Furthermore, to clarify the situation regarding people walking on The Heath, we would just like to point out that as trustees we feel that public access should be maintained. However, there are no public rights of way on this land.*
- The two new picnic benches are now in place. Thanks to all who assisted in their transport, assembly and installation.
- Litter picking equipment is now available so if anyone would like to make use of them, please contact the Clerk.

5. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

- A resident again raised the issue of flooding on the A140 Cromer Road from Low Lane to No 25 on the housing side.

The Chairman advised this has been raised previously with Highways without much joy however the Clerk will endeavour to speak to them again.

- The Hevingivers raised £372.30 at the bingo night for Edison Rose's Journey and tickets have been purchased for the family to see Father Christmas at Thursford.

6. MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION AND DECISION

a. Hevingham Under 5's

e. Allotments

- i) The Clerk reported that having contacted those tenants who had not used their plots very much, two have decided not to renew their tenancies and those remaining have given an undertaking to utilise their plots and keep them tidy. This now means we have 5 spare plots. All rent requests have been issued but only 5 have paid so far. The farmers entrance is much improved with the addition of the hardcore.

There was an issue with the lock on the tap recently which was rectified by Mr S Medler – thanks to him for helping with that at short notice.

On the 24th September the Clerk discovered the tap unlocked and open with the water left running and has brought this to the attention of those tenants that hold a key with a request to be more careful in future.

- ii) A tenant present outlined her thoughts for an Open Day which could be held in Spring 2020 and suggested as a precursor to this a smaller event on Sunday 27th October (which she would be happy to organise) when Councillors and tenants could be on site for two hours to speak to

potential tenants. All agreed this was a good idea and should be organised.

The next item was moved up the agenda with the agreement of the Chairman

7. MATTERS TO REPORT

f. Reports

District Councillor

Cty Cllr D Roper reported on Cllr J Neesam's behalf: The GNLP report has been delayed so the draft plan will not be published for consultation until January 2020 at the earliest.

County Councillor

The Council are now into the budget process and it is expected that Council Tax will increase by just under 4% with a further £16million of cuts on top of the £30million already proposed.

The NDR continues to be 'fun' with the safety audits on the roundabouts still to be published. It is hoped work will start on the western link in 2022.

The last boundary review was done 25 years ago and when considering this, the Council should think about who they best align with.

Cllr Roper was asked about the trimming of the trees on the A140 Cromer Road near St Faiths and advised whilst some of this land has been submitted to the GNLP for 2026 and beyond, the trees were getting unstable at the top, so the landowner had them cut.

There will be a planning application submitted shortly for a new recycling centre off the NDR near the airport.

6. MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION AND DECISION

f. Herbert Phillipo Footpath

Following discussions it was agreed the Clerk should ask Mr Bambridge if he can also cut back the section of hedge near the gate on Westgate and remove the elderberry bush from inside it which is causing visibility issues and also trim back the hedge on the car park side near the gate on New Road.

g. Planning

Nothing to consider or report.

h. Norfolk County Council Electoral Review

Having considered Cllr Roper's comments all agreed the current boundaries are fine as they are but Marsham could be added to boost numbers if needed, especially as Hevingham is already aligned with Marsham through the School.

i. Vintage Fair on the Village Green

This item was postponed as discussions with the 'Hevingivers' are currently taking place to possibly join together on this.

j. Village Shop

A resident outlined her ideas for a small affordable convenience shop and micro café in the village to be run as a non-profit making enterprise potentially opening in Spring 2021. It would have a low environmental impact with sustainability at heart and any profits going back into the village in some way. The idea is for it to be run by family and residents as an alternative social hub. Possible location near the Village Green subject to planning and nearby residents' thoughts. The allotment site was also put forward by a parishioner present. All agreed the concept sounded good in general and draft plans should be drawn up for further consideration in due course.

7. MATTERS TO REPORT

a. Correspondence

The Clerk has been given some guidance notes from the Police on various crime prevention subjects – if anyone would like copies, please see the Clerk.
