### HERBERT PHILIP ALLOTMENTS – PLOTS STILL AVAILABLE FOR RENT!

The Parish Council still has some allotments available to rent, opposite the School in New Road.

These allotments were intended to help bring an income into the village and therefore the Parish Council do not wish to leave them unallocated. The allotments are ready for use with water available from a central tap. Sheds are permitted on individual plots with prior permission. The allotment area is fenced to prevent rabbits stealing the produce! Rent is currently £30.00 per annum and due in September. Manure is occasionally provided for tenants use at no additional cost. Weed killing has recently been carried out to the central access road and all un-used plots are soon to be rotavated. A gate will shortly be installed across the access road to prevent unauthorised parking by non-allotment holders.

### 3. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING: Minutes of the meeting 5<sup>th</sup> June were agreed by all and signed by the Chairman.

### 4. MATTERS ARISING

County Councillor D Roper has confirmed that all junctions in the village have now been cut. Highways are aware of the drainage issues on Westgate Green and these are scheduled for works.

### 5. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

It was reported that there is a lot of litter on the footpath which runs along the A140 Cromer Road from The Fox to the Caravan Sales site. The Clerk will report to BDC.

**d. Village Hall Report:** Nothing to report. Next meeting 20<sup>th</sup> July 2018.


**e. Police Report:** No information available for May or June.

### f. County Councillor Report

The Clerk read a report from Cllr D Roper in his absence:

*There has been a change of leadership at County Hall in the saddest possible circumstances. We wait to see if the new leadership will signal any changes in policy. One area they are clear on is that they will not be looking to re-organise the structure of local government. You may have heard Radio Norfolk this morning reporting on the NDR and the fact that there have been at least 30 accidents since the road opened and at present over 20 signs are damaged. I have been pressing for further monitoring of the roundabouts and traffic on approach roads. Also, I want to make sure that when damage does happen that it gets repaired or replaced in good time. The other big issue for me continues to be recycling charges and possible increases in fly tipping. It is recorded that trips to recycling centres have dropped considerably since charges for DIY waste were introduced. I have visited Mayton Wood recently to ask staff about their experience of charges and it looks to me that there is confusion about what is free and what is not.*

### 3. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

Minutes of the meeting held on the 3<sup>rd</sup> July 2018 were agreed by all and signed by the Chairman.

### 5. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

It was reported that some of the kerbing on the corner of The Street as you come in from the A140 is loose and needs attention. The Clerk will report to Highways.

Cllr A Coldham reported that she has contacted both the Chair and Clerk of Buxton Parish Council regarding the sign for the 'Buxton Bash' as it was still in place a long time after the event was over but has not received any response. The sign is now down but still on the ground. It was generally felt that NCC Highways were responsible for granting permission for signs as it was put up on Highway land and therefore no further action could be taken.

### 6. MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION AND DECISION

*iii) Report from TT Jones*

As part of the annual clean and inspection programme it has been identified that the cover is missing from the light on The Street. Replacement will cost £48.96 + VAT. All agreed these works should be authorised.

*iv) Notice board on The Street*

The Clerk advised the Perspex has been damaged. Cost to repair is £110.00 +VAT. All agreed repairs should be authorised.

**c. Herbert Phillipo Allotments**

Cllr G Crane advised that having met recently to review the current position of the site, the committee feel the rents should remain the same for the next year and are currently looking at ways to promote the 'spare' plots. They would like to purchase a notice board specifically for the allotments which both the committee and tenants could use.

Following discussion and consideration of estimates provided by the Clerk, it was agreed an aluminium board should be purchased and Cllr G Crane will source the necessary posts.

The committee also felt it would be beneficial if they had perhaps a polo shirt or gilet with HPCAC on it, so when they were on site tenants would be easily able to identify them. Following discussions, it was agreed high visibility waistcoats would be a better option so the Clerk will obtain some prices for the next meeting.

The committee have agreed several documents which are required but need full council approval to put them in place. These had all been circulated prior to the meeting and were agreed.


**d. Allotment Rents**

All agreed both the Herbert Phillipo and Half Acre rents should remain unchanged.

**e. Planning**

i) The following plans were considered:

- 20181251 - Plot 1, Brick Kiln Road - No objections.
- 20181252 - Plot 2, Brick Kiln Road - No objections.
- 20181330 - Lefere, Low Lane - No objections.
- 20181284 - Cobbleacre Park, Brick Kiln Road - No objections.



ii) The Clerk provided the following updates:

- 20180441 – The Gables, Low Lane – Full approval.
- 20180942 – Southview, 29 Westgate Green – Full approval. (This application was amended to remove the cart shed, which now comes under Permitted Development Rights and therefore no longer needs permission).
- 20181050 – 34 Brick Kiln Road – Full approval.

#### **f. Hevingham Music Fest**

It was noted that two complaints had been received regarding the noise levels. The organiser of the event was present and explained that the bands had finished by 23:15. Regrettably there was some disturbance off the premises, which is out of the organiser's control but the minor trouble which occurred at the end of the event was dealt with by the Police. For next year, there will be more security and the event will finish at 22:30. The Police have recommended an on-site bar only, so attendees will not be able to bring in their own alcohol which should help curb any excessive drinking. Security will also guard the fencing, which this year was tampered with. The organiser is also considering having wristbands to confirm valid entry. There is a 'banned list' in place for next year as well.

In the five years this annual event has occurred, they have raised over £26,000.00 for Charity. This year they raised just over £4,000.00 which has been split between Dementia UK, MIND and Feline Care Cat Rescue.

All agreed appropriate steps are being taken to prevent future concerns and congratulated the organiser for the superb job she does in organising such a major event in the village, which the Parish Council fully support.

#### **g. Additional SAM location**

The Clerk has spoken to Highways who are happy for the Parish Council to trial the sign on Westgate, on the 20mph sign on the left-hand side as you head away from the School. If that does not prove suitable the Council can purchase another post to go elsewhere.

#### **h. Magazine printing**

The Clerk had obtained three quotes and all agreed to remain with the current printers.

#### **i. Parish Partnership Bid**

Cllr A Coldham suggested the Parish Council bid for a bus shelter to go on the Norwich to Aylsham side of the A140. Many said Highways have always said 'no' to this as there is not enough room. It was agreed that the Clerk should contact Highways to see what they will allow, if anything, before the Council agree to submit a bid.

### **7. MATTERS TO REPORT**

#### **b. Clerks Report**

The Clerk provided details of the latest set of results from the SAM sign which will be printed in the next magazine. Despite 'rumours' going around, the Clerk has been informed that the Vicar is not leaving Hevingham Church and works to the roof will be proceeding, hopefully by the end of October / beginning of November, but this has been delayed by the presence of bats.


The Clerk reported that the footpath by the allotments is looking very untidy and needs clearing and weed killing. The Chairman will attend to the weed killing.

#### **c. Youth Advocate Report**

The group will open again on the 13<sup>th</sup> September 2018 with £1000.00 worth of new equipment to use. It has been noticed that the swings are missing – does the hall need any help with fundraising to replace these as the group do use the play area? It was confirmed that it is just one of the posts which has rotten and is in the process of being replaced so specific fund raising is not required. Cllr M Williamson proposed the Parish Council cover the cost of the repairs and this was seconded by Cllr A Ramsbottom. It was therefore agreed the village hall should inform the Council of the costs once known for further consideration.

#### **d. Village Hall Report**

ROSPA have completed the annual inspection of the play area. Cllr T Palmer pointed out that the hedges around the hall grounds really need cutting back – this will be raised at the next village hall meeting on the 24<sup>th</sup> September 2018.



#### e. Police Report

The Clerk advised there were 2 crimes in the village during May and 6 in June.

#### f. Reports

##### County Councillor Report

A traffic order will be printed in the EDP on the 7<sup>th</sup> September 2018 concerning the reduction in the speed limit on the A140 Cromer Road. The consultation on this will run until the 2<sup>nd</sup> October 2018.

The County Council are still looking at making cuts with the mobile library service possibly facing cuts of 40%. It is likely Council Tax will increase next year by 3%. Cllr D Roper is keen to keep the bus subsidies.

Fly tipping has increased since April 2018 by 22% with a noticeable increase in the weights of green bins also. The Council were looking at scrapping / suspending the new waste disposal charges at their meeting in July but this was voted down by the Council as a whole. Cllr D Roper is continuing to push for more safety audits on the roundabouts on the NDR. In answer to questions, Cllr D Roper advised: Extra lighting is unlikely to be installed; the NDR is being well used and has been completed to the specification set out; the lane markings are part of the safety audit being pushed for.



## Aylsham Lightnings off to a flying start!

Aylsham Lightnings have won their first match of the season - beating near neighbours Broadland Swallows in the Norfolk Rapidplay Handicap Cup. Players played 2 games where they had to complete all their moves in 30 minutes. ECF (English Chess Federation) Rapidplay grades were then taken into consideration in determining the overall winners. This meant that the Lightnings only needed 3.5 out of 8 points to win. In the end, the Broadland team (Roy Hughes, Ken McEwan, Tony Arnold and Andy Jones) scored 4.5 points and the Aylsham team (Bruce Carman, Daniel Hedges, Rupert Martin and Bob Grindrod) scored the 3.5 points they needed. Aylsham now progress to the quarter-finals. Rupert Martin again performed particularly well for the Lightnings in winning both of his games. In the league, Aylsham Chess Club teams have now completed 4 NCCA (Norfolk County Chess Association) fixtures. Aylsham Spitfires are top of Division 2 - after 3 wins and 1 draw. Rupert Martin and David Owen have perfect records for the Spitfires with both achieving 2 wins from 2 games. Aylsham Hurricanes are mid-table in Division 3 - after 1 win, 2 draws and 1 loss. Bob Grindrod has been top scorer for the Hurricanes with 2 wins from 2 games.

Aylsham Ex-Service and Social Club is the home of the recently formed Aylsham Chess Club. The chess club meets on Monday evenings throughout the September to June season.




The annual calendars for all bin collections have now been **made digital**, so can be accessed by residents via the **Broadland District Council website** and be **printed at home** or **downloaded** onto computers/mobile devices.

This change has been made due to **increased online access** and the issues we've had when delivering the calendars during the **bad weather** we typically experience at this time of year. As calendars are left under residents' bin-lids **rain can damage them** and results in many **calendars being unusable**. To counter this we have made the decision to put the calendars online only and we will not be delivering calendars under the bin lids as normal. Residents will be able to find the calendar relevant to them by using the online bin finder. If there are **issues surrounding computer/internet access** we are able to **print copies internally** and **send them to residents** via post.

6,046 within the 85<sup>th</sup> Percentile Limit of 35.8mph.

Average speed of those over the 85<sup>th</sup> Percentile Limit was 36.4mph.

Overall average speed 26.7mph.

Max speed recorded was 85mph at 10:55pm on Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> September 2018.

### **THE STREET (12<sup>th</sup> October 18 – 15<sup>th</sup> November 18) – 30MPH LIMIT**

33,215 vehicles drove past.

28,233 within the 85<sup>th</sup> Percentile Limit of 28mph.

4,982 over the 85<sup>th</sup> Percentile Limit.

Average speed of those over the 85<sup>th</sup> Percentile Limit was 33mph.

Overall average speed 21.9mph.

Max speed recorded was 65mph at 14:55 on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> October 2018.


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The **85th Percentile Speed** is the speed that 85 percent of vehicles do not exceed. Another way of looking at this is that only 15 percent of vehicles go faster than this speed, and 85 percent go at or below this speed. The 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed may vary slightly each time as this is based on the first 85 vehicles in 100 and is dependent on the speed that the vehicles are going through the sign. This is better than taking an overall average and it excludes the odd high speeders which would give false figures.

Drivers who exceed the 90th percentile have a significantly higher risk of crashing.

The Police use the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed to set speed limits and check they are appropriate.


