HERBERT PHILIP ALLOTMENTS – PLOTS STILL AVAILABLE FOR RENT!

The Parish Council still has some allotments available to rent, opposite the School in New Road. These allotments were intended to help bring an income into the village and therefore the Parish Council do not wish to leave them unallocated.

The allotments are ready for use with water available from a central tap. Sheds are permitted on individual plots with prior permission. The allotment area is fenced to prevent rabbits stealing the produce! Rent is currently £30.00 per annum and due in September. Manure is occasionally provided for tenants use at no additional cost. A gate prevents unauthorised parking by non-allotment holders.

BROADLAND CHESS CLUB - We are now officially the 10th largest Chess club in England.

The Norfolk Rapidplay Congress was held on January 28th and we must offer our congratulations to BCC member Trevor Deniss on winning the Peter Burnett Cup. This was obviously a surprise to him, so I will now hand over to him to tell his own story.

"I learned to play chess in 1949 when I acquired a little HBF pocket chess set which I still use for playing through some of the many games by my favourite players from the past. I had this in the same year that Bobby Fisher's sister bought him his first chess set. He was 6 year's old and a little more talented than I was!"

"I was 11 and had just started my secondary education. I'd never heard of Bobby Fischer and wouldn't know anything about him until I had emerged from my teens. My teenage idol was Mikhail Tal and I played many times through the one book of his collected games which I had and was edited by P H Clarke. I still have it, with all the pencilled ticks that I inserted by the games as I played them many times each. The collected games of Alekhine and Capablanca also suffered the same treatment. Unfortunately, at about the time when Fisher came on the scene, I started to lose interest in the game. I had played competitive chess for Bishop's Stortford and the Royal Insurance company in London. I also played in Division 3 of the Postal Chess League run by the British Chess Magazine, using a dozen cardboard 'Portland' chess sets, which cost about 5/- (25p) each, to keep a record of the games. Each game progressed quite slowly as it was recorded on a special postcard which had to be sent off to opponents for the princely sum of a penny halfpenny (less than 1p in decimal currency) and I remember the excitement I felt as each reply came through the post. All this came to an end in 1962 when other interests took over, which included Backgammon, and I became runner-up British Backgammon champion when I lost the final game in the Philip Morris championship which attracted over 200 entrants and was held in the University Arms, Cambridge in the mid-1970s. I never played chess again for over 50 years until I joined the Broadland club 4 years ago. Backgammon has famously been called "the cruellest game". But chess is a close contender as it brings many frustrations but my advice to all the young players in the Club is to keep playing the game – don't give up on it, it will bring you many hours of enjoyment and you will never regret the hours you spend trying to master this fascinating game."

Our usual various in-club championships are progressing although there are no cup matches played in January. Our Junior members continue to perform well both as team members and individually. Currently Karthik Saravanan is ranked 54 for <16 boys in the English top 100, his sister Preethi is 55 <14 girls in standard play. In Rapidplay English top 100 Preethi is ranked 33 <14 girls with Darcy Pashley 40 <11 girls. Karthik is 41 <16 boys.

**PRECIS MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF HEVINGHAM PARISH COUNCIL
HELD ON 3rd OCTOBER 2017 AT THE VILLAGE HALL**

3. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

Minutes of the meeting held on the 5th September 2017 were agreed by all and signed by the Chairman following a minor amendment under item 5ai – the children's age quoted should have read 12-17.

4. MATTERS ARISING

Photocopier

The copier has now been serviced and did not require a new toner cartridge to be fitted. Lines are appearing on copies due to the drum and drum cleaning blade being worn and needing replacement. The Clerk has already authorised purchase by Copyprint. The total cost to replace the worn parts and service the machine will be £143.04 including vat.

5. MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION AND ACTION

a. Planning

The following plan was considered:

i) 20171543 – Crosstrees, 23 Brick Kiln Road – No objections

ii) Saffron Housing land on Westgate

The proposals were discussed at length with Mr Watts stating:

- Saffron have come back to the Parish Council, having addressed the previous concerns raised, to see if the project can be progressed and a planning application submitted.
- Originally Saffron were told that to move the electricity cable would be in excess of £100,000 which was not affordable. UKPN later approached Saffron as they wanted to move the cable and agreed a cost with Saffron of just over £40,000.
- The drainage scheme has been redesigned and will be capable of taking the flow from a 1 in 100 year event if necessary.
- Whilst there is no data available to prove local need for shared equity housing BDC have advised that applications are high and consistent on these types of homes.
- The village will benefit from having affordable housing available and it maybe that Saffron could help the village with any projects they wish to pursue, if there is any cash available once all the homes are sold, however this is not guaranteed.
- BDC have confirmed that 8 properties fall within the agreed consultation threshold of 25 and therefore will not put pressure on the School as numbers ebb and flow.
- Highways are happy with the proposal.

In a vote, 1 Councillor supported the project moving forward and 9 objected. Saffron were asked if they would be prepared to sell the 'spare' land back to the Parish Council but advised they will have to consider what action to now take.

6e. County Councillors report

The NDR will now be partially opened by Christmas 2017 with a hopeful final completion date of April 2018. Concerning the bollards on The Heath Highways have advised: *We have sent letters to both properties concerning the encroachments. The letter states that the bollards are on highway land, are not allowed to be there and must be removed. It also states that we will hold the residents liable for any incident occurring now that they have been made aware of the status of the land. We have heard back from one of the properties who have complained bitterly about various highway matters - and responded reiterating what they need to do. We will soon follow this letter up with a final warning before the matter is referred to our legal department.* The Chairman asked if highways will be pursuing all properties in the village that have erected bollards on highway land as there needs to be consistency and Cllr D Roper advised highways will deal with any that are reported to them.

Council tax will increase by 4.9% next year. From May 2019 the Council will be going back to a cabinet system rather than continuing with committees as they have done for the past 4 years.

5. MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION AND ACTION (continued)

a. Planning

iii) The Clerk advised 20171323 (Brambles, 6 Brick Kiln Road) was approved however Break have written to the Parish Council explaining that they will not now be going ahead with the project as having taken into account the views of parishioners, they feel the young people would not be welcomed and accepted into the village. The Clerk has also been given a copy of a letter that local residents have sent to Break expressing their regret at Breaks decision.

b. Herbert Phillip Fund

Under 5's

The Clerk has received correspondence asking if the remaining funds could be put towards some new outdoor wooden play equipment and this was agreed by all.

Trod Path

The Clerk advised a refund has now been received from Highways for £5,377.85 which means the first section cost a total of £7244.30, which was split 50/50 between NCC and the Parish Council. The Chairman suggested that section 2 should be put on hold and further prices requested as the £5,200.00 agreed seems high and this was agreed. The Clerk will ask Highways to provide a full specification for the works to section 2 and a full written quotation.

c. Finance

d. Parish Partnership Bid 2018/19

Following discussions, it was agreed the Clerk should write to Threeways and explain what is intended for the verge in front of their property to see if they have any observations they wish to make before proceeding and also request a full specification for this section from Highways along with a written quotation. Providing all the necessary information can be collated in time, it was agreed a bid should be submitted for both this and section 2.

6. MATTERS TO REPORT

a. Correspondence

Norfolk CAB are seeking donations. Cllr T Palmer proposed £30.00 and this was agreed by all.

Community Action Norfolk membership is now due for renewal. All agreed to renew at £20.00 for this year with a review next year as to whether it is worth keeping.

b. Clerks Report

The Clerk received a complaint at the end of last week regarding damage to graveyard items during grass cutting and the speed at which the cutting was being done with no respect for the graves. The Clerk has walked the churchyard with the church warden and it appears that a total of 9 graves were damaged. Having contacted the Garden Guardian, the Clerk was told the items should not be on the graves as the Churchyard Regulations clearly state the graves will be mown over. Rev M McPhee explained that she is now ensuring when new burials and internments take place, relatives are given a copy of

the regulations and asked to sign to say they will abide by these. Rev M McPhee also commented that there has been liberal use of weed killer causing complaints.

The Clerk suggested the Parish Council revert back to previous years when the Church arranged their own grass cutting and the Council reimbursed the cost as an annual grant. Although this means the vat cannot be reclaimed it would keep Church affairs under the Church's umbrella. This was agreed by all, including Rev M McPhee. The Clerk will end the contract with the Garden Guardian at the end of this season for both the Church and Village grass cutting as Councillors have not been happy with the cutting this year or the speed at which the mowers fly around. The car park verge has also been missed on occasions and had to be chased.

c. Youth Advocate Report

Further enquiries have been made into having a skate park installed with a second price coming in at around £30,000.00, of which £8,000.00 is tarmac costs. Cllr A Ramsbottom will be taking this to the village hall meeting on the 16th October for permission to site the park within the hall grounds.

d. Police Report

The Clerk advised there were 3 crimes in the village during July all of which were classed as violent or sexual offences.

7. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Cllr A Coldham informed the meeting that Peggy Wise passed away on the 19th September aged 94; the Hevingham Laurel Club have been nominated for BDC's Heart community award and new pads for the defibrillators have been ordered.

A resident asked that thanks be recorded to the gentleman who cuts the verges along Westgate, in between the bollards, when this is in fact Highways responsibility. Agreed.

A question was raised regarding Outdoor Gym Equipment for the village. The Clerk advised a bid was submitted for this under the Herbert Phillip Fund but was not pursued due to lack of interest. Cllr A Ramsbottom advised the money set aside for the Gym went to the play equipment at the hall.

Following a question, it was confirmed that the Sanders bus which goes down The Street for the school children is a public bus which residents can use. The timetable will hopefully be printed in the next magazine.

a. Finance

ii) Income and Expenditure account for 6 months to 30 September 2017

Figures had been previously circulated and were agreed by all.

c. Parish Partnership Bid 2018/19

NCC Highways will not allow outside contractors to do the majority of the works as the whole point of the scheme is that the Parish works 'in partnership' with NCC. The Clerk suggested the Council submit a bid under the Parish Partnership Scheme to cover the 3 areas which can be completed. Total cost £14,200 but if the bid is successful this would be split 50/50 so the cost to the Parish Council would be £7,100. Following a vote all agreed the Clerk should submit a bid.

e. Campaign to lower the speed limit on the A140

Mr S Ward addressed the Council explaining a group have come together to try to reduce the speed limit through Hevingham to Marsham from 50mph to 40mph. The intention is to take a case to the next NCC meeting on the 19th January 2018. All agreed to support the group and the Clerk will send a confirmatory letter to Mr Ward.

f. Planning

The Clerk gave an update on recent planning applications: 20171461 (Norwich Caravans) approved, 20171543 (Crosstrees, 23 Brick Kiln Road) approved and 20170894 (Whistling Winds, 10 The Street) approved following appeal.

i. Bus shelter on the A140

Cllr D Fox-Willis explained that the bus shelter is being left in a terrible state at the moment with lots of rubbish being left around and today the bus timetable had been removed, ripped up and left on the floor. It also smells like it is being used as a toilet and there are concerns that someone is sleeping in there. The Clerk advised we only pay to have it cleaned once a month but she has highlighted the possible 'rough sleeper' with the Police and is waiting to hear back from them. All agreed to see what the outcome is with the Police for now.

7. MATTERS TO REPORT

b. Clerks Report

The Clerk provided details of the first two sets of results from the SAM sign.

The Clerk had previously circulated full details from the training she attended on the GDPR. The new regulations come into force on the 25th May 2018.

Allotment training is available in February 2018 and the Clerk feels it would be beneficial for her and a member of the allotment committee to attend. All agreed. Cllr G Crane will attend with the Clerk.

c. Youth Advocate Report

The Skate Park will no longer be pursued as the Village Hall committee have declined permission due to the annual insurance cost of around £1,000.

e. Police Report

The Clerk advised there were 10 crimes in the village during August and 6 in September.

Average speed of those over the 85th Percentile Limit was 25mph.

Overall average speed 17.6mph.

Max speed recorded was 70mph at 7:40 on the 21st November 2017

THE HEATH (12th Dec 17 – 12th Jan 18) – 30MPH LIMIT (2)

9,379 vehicles drove past.

7,972 within the 85th Percentile Limit of 33.5mph. 1,407 over the 85th Percentile Limit.

Average speed of those over the 85th Percentile Limit was 36mph.

Overall average speed 19.4mph.

Max speed recorded was 80mph at 7:45am on the 11th January 2018.

THE STREET (12th Dec 17 – 12th Jan 18) – 30MPH LIMIT (2)

31,351 vehicles drove past.

26,648 within the 85th Percentile Limit of 28mph. 4,703 over the 85th Percentile Limit.

Average speed of those over the 85th Percentile Limit was 33mph.

Overall average speed 22.6mph.

Max speed recorded was 65mph at 6:40 on the 25th January 2018.

NB: The **85th Percentile Speed** is the **speed** that **85** percent of vehicles do not exceed. Another way of looking at this is that only **15** percent of vehicles go faster than this **speed**, and **85** percent go at or below this **speed**. Drivers who exceed the **90th percentile** have a significantly higher risk of crashing.

These figures clearly show that whilst we do not have a major problem with speeding in our village, there are several drivers who do exceed the speed limits and some dangerously so!
