### **HERBERT PHILIPPO ALLOTMENTS – PLOTS STILL AVAILABLE FOR RENT!**

The Parish Council still has some allotments available to rent, opposite the School in New Road.

These allotments were intended to help bring an income into the village and therefore the Parish Council do not wish to leave them unallocated. The allotments are ready for use with water available from a central tap. Sheds are permitted on individual plots with prior permission. The allotment area is fenced to prevent rabbits stealing the produce! Rent is currently £30.00 per annum and due in September. Manure is occasionally provided for tenants use at no additional cost. Weed killing has recently been carried out to the central access road and all un-used plots are soon to be rotavated. A gate will shortly be installed across the access road to prevent unauthorised parking by non-allotment holders.

If anyone is interested in taking on one of the empty allotments, please contact the Clerk.

Answering any queries about deadlines, costs\* etc.,  
Chasing regular articles if not received,  
Encouraging advertisers and articles (especially for local services / groups),  
Ensuring adverts are paid for before they are put into the magazine,  
Directing all payments to the Parish Council,  
Sending to the printers in a word format,  
Making sure the printers send the Clerk a pdf version via email for the website,  
Taking delivery of the magazines, sorting them and delivering them to Councillors,  
Forwarding the printers invoice to the Clerk for payment.

(\* Costs are set by the Parish Council)

Whilst this is not officially a paid role, a nominal sum of £50.00 will be paid per quarterly edition to the editor to cover 'expenses' once the magazine is printed and delivered. This would be a great opportunity for someone wanting to showcase their graphics skills to bring a vibrant and informative publication to the village.

### **1. APOLOGIES**

Apologies were received from Cllr G Crane and County Cllr D Roper.

### **2. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST AND DISPENSATION REQUESTS**

There were no declarations of interest or dispensation requests.



### 3. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

Minutes of the meeting held on the 4<sup>th</sup> September 2018 were agreed by all and signed by the Chairman.

### 4. MATTERS ARISING

The Clerk advised that, whilst the owner of Cobbleacre Park, had not really considered residents use of the recently proposed shop, they would have no objections to this, once it is up and running, provided it doesn't cause any 'issues'.

### 5. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Nothing was raised.

### 6. MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION AND DECISION

#### a. Finance

##### i) Accounts for payment

(It was noted that the magazine is often quite thin with not many adverts, despite attempts to encourage advertising and articles. It was therefore agreed that all Councillors will try to promote use of the magazine where possible).

#### b. Herbert Phillipo Fund

**Trod path:** Highways have advised works are scheduled for the last quarter of the financial year i.e. Jan / March 2019.

**Under 5's:** The committee have asked if the remaining funds can be used for a number of small repair and maintenance projects, storage for the pre school and new outside resources, instead of the projects approved. All agreed this was acceptable but funds will only be paid on production of receipted invoices or direct to suppliers, as per the original agreement.

#### c. Herbert Phillipo Allotments

The Clerk has obtained two quotations for waistcoats. All agreed to go with Devlin Stitches as these were recommended by the Bowls Club.

#### d. Planning

i) There were no new plans to consider.

ii) The Clerk provided the following updates:

- 20181251 – Plot 1, Brick Kiln Road - Full approval.
- 20181252 – Plot 2, Brick Kiln Road - Full approval.

#### e. Parish Partnership Scheme

Highways have confirmed the width of path available at the bus stop will prohibit any installation as the shelter would need a minimum of 500mm from the edge of the road. As there is nothing else the Parish Council are currently looking at doing, it was agreed a bid will not be submitted this year.

### 7. MATTERS TO REPORT

#### a. Correspondence

Broadland District Council are closing their Parish Tree Warden Scheme on 14<sup>th</sup> November 2018 which will then be replaced by a new independent Broadland Tree Warden Network. The new network will have access to BDC's tree planting budget on a 'use it or lose it' basis. The Parish Council are asked to complete a short questionnaire regarding Tree Wardens – answers supplied at the meeting. As there is not a village Tree Warden and there are not any major trees in the village which the Parish Council are responsible for, all agreed the Parish Council would not wish to attend the inaugural meeting in November or be involved in supporting the new network.

### **b. Clerks Report**

The Clerk provided details of the latest set of results from the SAM sign which will be printed in the next magazine. The highest speed recorded this time was 80mph at 9:35am on the 15<sup>th</sup> August on Brick Kiln Road just up from the Village Hall which is completely unacceptable.

The Vicar has reported that the final survey before the replacement of the Church roof, will be completed this Friday morning. Scaffolding will start to be erected on Monday and then, subject to the final go ahead from the Bat Conservation Society, work will commence for the period of 6 weeks. Due to the time that has elapsed, the project is now costing £40,472 of which the Church has raised £19,258. The work has now been able to go ahead because of 2 generous interest free loans amounting to £16,000, in addition to all the Church funds being used, which means the Church now has just about a zero bank balance. Grants will continue to be sought so the loans can be repaid. The Vicar has expressed her thanks to the Parish Council for their contribution last year, via the Hevingivers, for which they are grateful.

### **c. Youth Advocate Report**

The group has now re-opened after the Summer break and the £1000.00 worth of new equipment purchased has been well received. It has been confirmed the group came second in the Tesco Blue Coin Scheme which means a prize of £2000.00. The Village Hall Committee have agreed the group can install a zip wire in the Hall grounds providing the group can obtain the necessary funding. The Tesco prize can only be used for the group and so this money will not be able to be put towards the zip wire as that will be used by the whole community, which means more fund raising will now be undertaken for this.

### **d. Village Hall Report**

Nothing to report as Cllr M Williamson missed the last meeting however he is aware that replacement of the swing post is still being worked on.

### **e. Police Report**

The Clerk advised there were 2 crimes in the village during July: 1 anti-social behaviour (on or near open space near Brick Kiln Road) and 1 anti-social behaviour (on or near Churchill Close). Further information can be accessed via [www.police.uk](http://www.police.uk).

### **f. Reports**

#### **District Councillor Report**

A new Managing Director has been appointed to cover BDC and SNDC as part of the collaboration.

#### **County Councillor Report**

The Clerk gave a report from Cllr D Roper in his absence: The main item to report is the current consultation on the future of children's centres which runs until 12th November. At present there are 53 children's (or Sure Start) centres in Norfolk and under the proposals 46 of these could close. In place of these services the council is proposing more outreach mobile work for the families in the highest level of need. However, in practice this will mean a much smaller service aimed at a much smaller number of families than those that currently use the children's centres. The reason for the proposed changes is that the council has halved the budget for this part of children's services. Cllr D Roper is very unhappy at the proposals and the way the consultation is being done and is currently seeking for the consultation to be suspended and rewritten.

### **8. MATTERS FOR FUTURE DISCUSSION AND DATE OF NEXT MEETING**

Next meeting is on the 4<sup>th</sup> December 2018 at 7:30pm in the Village Hall.

### **REPORTING HIGHWAY ISSUES IN THE VILLAGE**

Did you know you can report problems with footpaths (including public rights of way) and roads direct to Norfolk County Council? In days gone by these matters were always reported to the Parish Council, who then reported them to NCC, but as with all things nowadays things have moved on! So, if you see a blocked, damaged or overgrown right of way, an overgrown verge, a pothole or two, or a damaged sign etc. you no longer have to wait until the next Parish Council meeting to report it – you can go directly to: <https://apps.norfolk.gov.uk/highwaysdefect> and report it immediately. You can choose to register so you can track the progress of your issue or simply report anonymously – the second option will not allow you to track progress. Reporting yourself will guarantee accurate information is provided to Norfolk County Council.

## **HEVINGHAM SPEED SIGN RESULTS**

(since last magazine)

### **BRICK KILN ROAD (20<sup>th</sup> November 18 – 20<sup>th</sup> December 18) – 20MPH LIMIT**

16,562 vehicles drove past.

14,078 within the 85<sup>th</sup> Percentile Limit of 27.3mph.

2,484 over the 85<sup>th</sup> Percentile Limit.

Average speed of those over the 85<sup>th</sup> Percentile Limit was 25mph.

Overall average speed 20.2mph.

**Max speed recorded was 60mph at 15.45 on Saturday the 15<sup>th</sup> December 2018.**

### **WESTGATE (6<sup>th</sup> January 19 – 5<sup>th</sup> February 19) – 20MPH LIMIT**

5,657 vehicles drove past.

4,808 within the 85<sup>th</sup> Percentile Limit of 24.8mph.

849 over the 85<sup>th</sup> Percentile Limit.

Average speed of those over the 85<sup>th</sup> Percentile Limit was 23.9mph.

Overall average speed 19.6mph.

**Max speed recorded was 55mph at 06:20 on Thursday 24<sup>th</sup> January 2019.**

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The **85th Percentile Speed** is the speed that 85 percent of vehicles do not exceed. Another way of looking at this is that only 15 percent of vehicles go faster than this speed, and 85 percent go at or below this speed. The 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed may vary slightly each time as this is based on the first 85 vehicles in 100 and is dependent on the speed that the vehicles are going through the sign. This is better than taking an overall average and it excludes the odd high speeders which would give false figures.

Drivers who exceed the 90th percentile have a significantly higher risk of crashing.

The Police use the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed to set speed limits and check they are appropriate.



## **Broadland Chess Club**

This month we have two excellent reports to make as BCC continues to provide a strong showing in both national and local tournaments. The Sheringham Junior Chess Congress was held on Saturday 9th February and members of Broadland chess club featured prominently among the prize-winners. In the under-13 section, Benedict Ward finished 3rd - his third consecutive podium finish! In the under-10 section, Jacob Davison and George Hall finished 1st=. Jacob won the tournament trophy on sum of progressive scores and George won the North Norfolk Primary Schools' trophy on relative grading performance. In the under-8 section, Ruby Perry was 2nd, Django Stephanides-Price was 3rd and George Artherton won a medal as the top u-7. The tournament is part of the Norfolk Junior Grand Prix and four Broadland players are currently in the top ten: Benjie Perry is 4th, Benedict Ward is 6th, Ruby Perry is 9th and Jacob Davison is 10th. The next tournament in the GP will be in Norwich in March. Four senior members travelled to the University of Birmingham by a variety of modes of transport, Gerald by train, Andrew and Leysaa by car and believe it or not Richard arrived from Belgium via train and foot! However, all of this effort was worth it as the team managed to achieve 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the 20/20 Rapidplay tournament. The picture taken by Roy Hughes shows Gerald Moore proudly displaying the trophy, please excuse the quality as some are better chess players than photographers!! One of the players in the 20/20 event, fourteen year old Leysaa Bin-Suhayl, played in a tournament in Shropshire in early January and, in the course of five rounds, played not one but two Grand Masters! Impressively, he drew with both of these elite players. Many congratulations to him. I hope that all of our readers are enjoying the lovely sunshine. As usual BCC meets at the Kings Head Coltishall, on Monday and Wednesday evenings, the Junior club on Mondays. 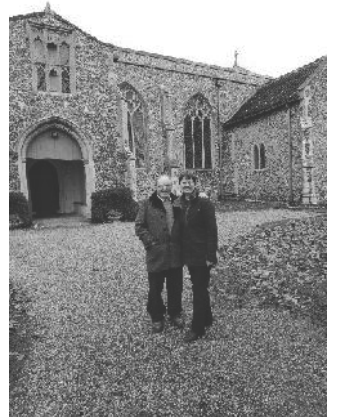

## Rector's Ramblings

### The Church Roof

Is finished! It was completed the week before Christmas. It's the first time I've seen the church without tarpaulin! It's been amazing to see God's miracle in financing it. The week the invoice was received I had a phone call letting me know about a Legacy – someone had left a donation to the church for repairs of £37,500! Yes, I jumped up and down and cheered as there was no need to take out the 2 interest free loans. I've often heard this sort of story happening; wonderfully it's happened to Hevingham PCC. So there is hope and joy now and for the future for this building and all who come to services and visit it. Like the one Hevingham PCC have just received, it could be perfect timing. We've also heard from Garfield Weston Foundation who have given a grant of £5,000 towards the roof repairs. It means we'll have some money left towards our maintenance issues in the church, repairs we'll be prioritising later in the spring. Make a note in your diary: **Sunday 26 May, 10.30am**, we're having a **service of celebration** of the completion of the Church Roof; do come along and celebrate with us and give thanks to God for ensuring the building is weather proof and we can focus on the future.



**Mothering Sunday**, 31<sup>st</sup> March, we're having a special service to say "thank you" at 11am. Come along for fun and celebration. Activities and worship for all ages.

**Lent:** I've been doing a bit of decluttering recently although I have to admit it is work in progress! Paper, clearing stuff out to charity shops or passing onto others things they'll enjoy using or reading and which I no longer need. I've found it therapeutic. It's a chance to think and ponder my priorities, a chance to ask myself why I am here and what I should be doing.

The kind of questions my decluttering has raised for me are the kind of questions to ask ourselves during Lent, which starts in March. We can declutter for a time by giving things up but perhaps more positively we can ask what can we do to help others, to contribute to the community we're part of: what should we be doing? You may find it helpful coming into our open church for some quiet reflection, or a wander around the churchyard or sitting on one of our benches giving thanks for the countryside we live in and are part of.

**Easter:** Then it's Easter. We've services to help us remember and celebrate the most amazing thing: Jesus rising from the dead. Come and hear the story during the week. We've a number of services:

- Maundy Thursday, 7pm, at Horsford Church, remembering the last meal of Jesus with His friends
- Good Friday, 3pm, quiet reflective service at Hevingham Church, as we ponder Jesus' dying on the cross.
- Easter Sunday, 11am, a celebration communion at Hevingham Church

On Easter **Saturday 20 April**, between 10am and 12 noon we've a **children's activity morning** at Horsford Church. Pop along anytime for an Easter egg hunt and craft activities. Refreshments will be available. It's all free!

**Do you love your church?** Would you like to be a Church Warden? You may even like to be a member of the PCC, the church council. Perhaps come onto the Electoral Roll (there are forms in church or contact me) as a way of saying "I love my church and want it to be around." **3. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING**

Minutes of the meeting held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> October 2018 were agreed by all and signed by the Chairman.

**4. MATTERS ARISING**

There were no matters on which to report.

**5. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION**

- A resident reported a dirty and obscured 30mph sign on The Heath – the Clerk will report to Highways.
- A resident asked if anything can be done regarding the bank which is eroding as you turn left from Church Lane onto the A140 Cromer Road. It is thought to be privately owned but the Clerk will refer to Highways to see if they can build up.
- A resident asked whose responsibility it was to inform residents of the road closure on Brick Kiln Road recently. It was confirmed as NCC.
- Residents present raised several questions and objections to the parcel of land on The Heath / The Turn which has been put forward under the GNLP for consideration. It was confirmed that the Parish Council will take parishioners views into account when agreeing their response to the consultation.

*The Chairman left the room at 8:20pm to allow for discussions on the GNLP and Cllr P Carrick took over the Chair.*

**a. Planning**

There is the opportunity for them to build a further 6/8 properties on the empty land and Saffron have offered to complete another housing survey to confirm what sort of properties would be suitable. 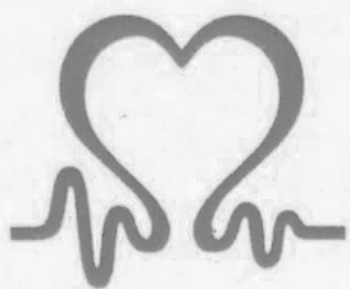

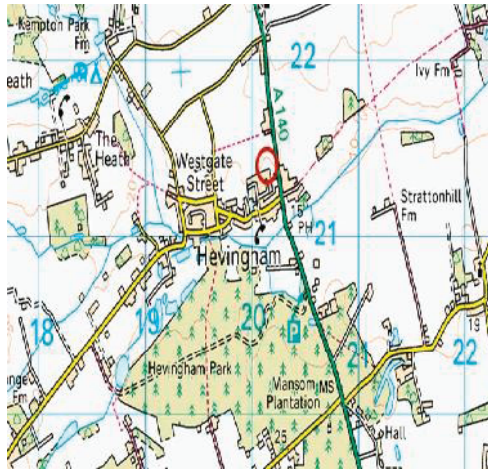
